FORMS OF SEX TRAFFICKING

Federal law provided the following definitions:

Trafficker/Pimp Trafficking

There is a third party who is “brokering” the exchanges of the sexual act for a tangible item, typically money.

Gang Trafficking

The trafficking is a source of generating money for the gang, and the gang member is involved in the trafficking of the victim.

Familial-Controlled Trafficking

This type of sex trafficking occurs when a family member or guardian sells the minor for a sex act.

Survival Sex Trafficking

A type of sex trafficking that does not involve a third party where commercial sex acts are exchanged for basic needs including food, shelter, safety, or to support a drug addiction.

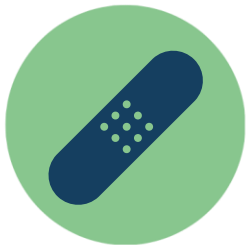


Vulnerable Populations At Risk of Human Trafficking

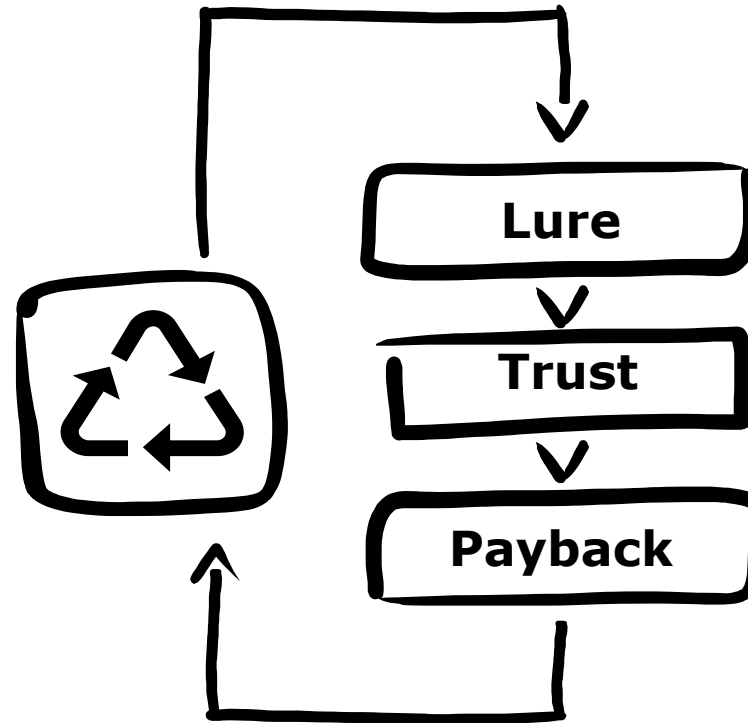

What does Human Trafficking Look Like?

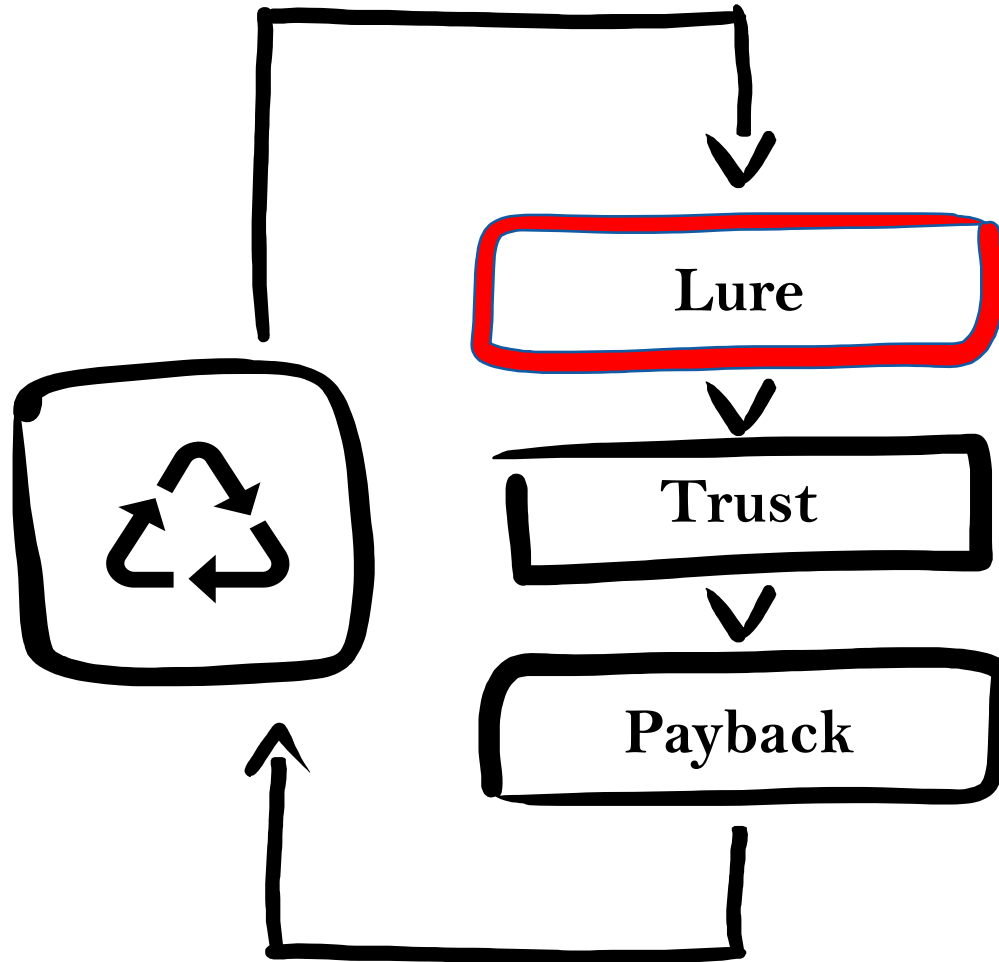


Three Common Stages of HT Recruitment

Traffickers are known to engage in constant recruitment to attempt to entice children into their web of control.

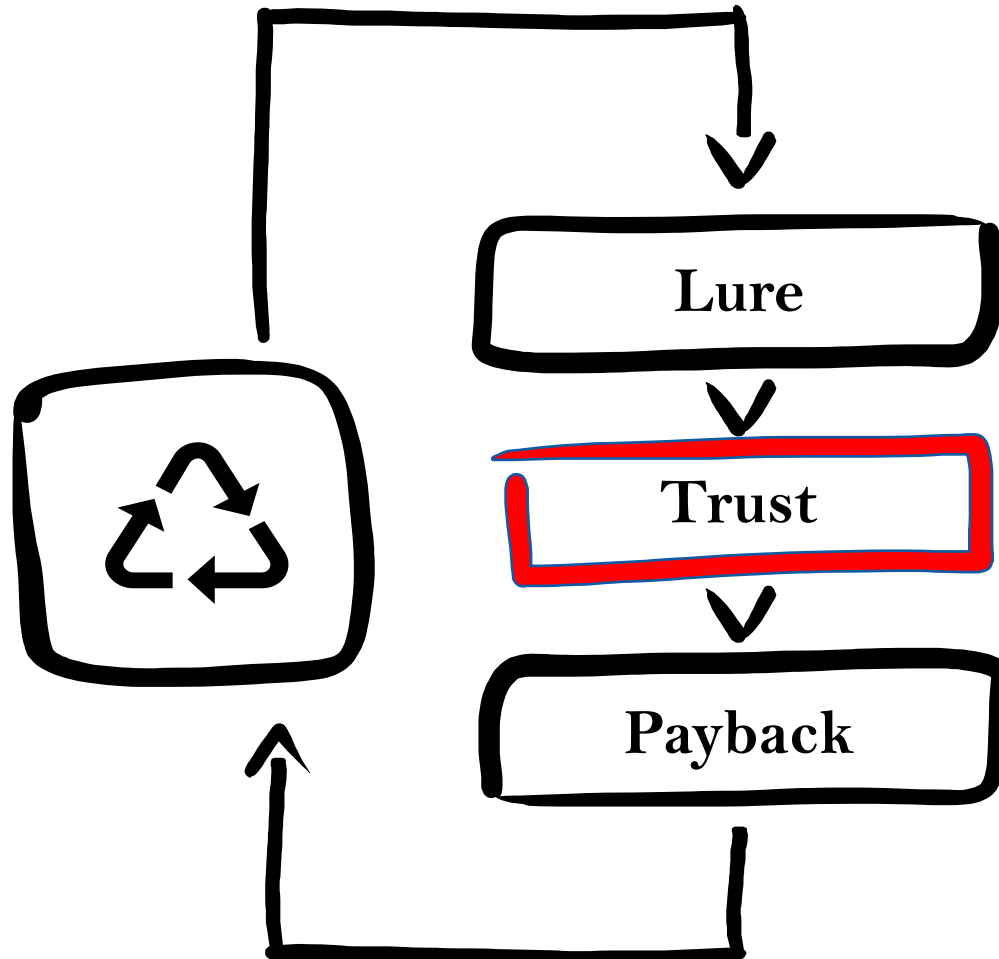


Lure Stage



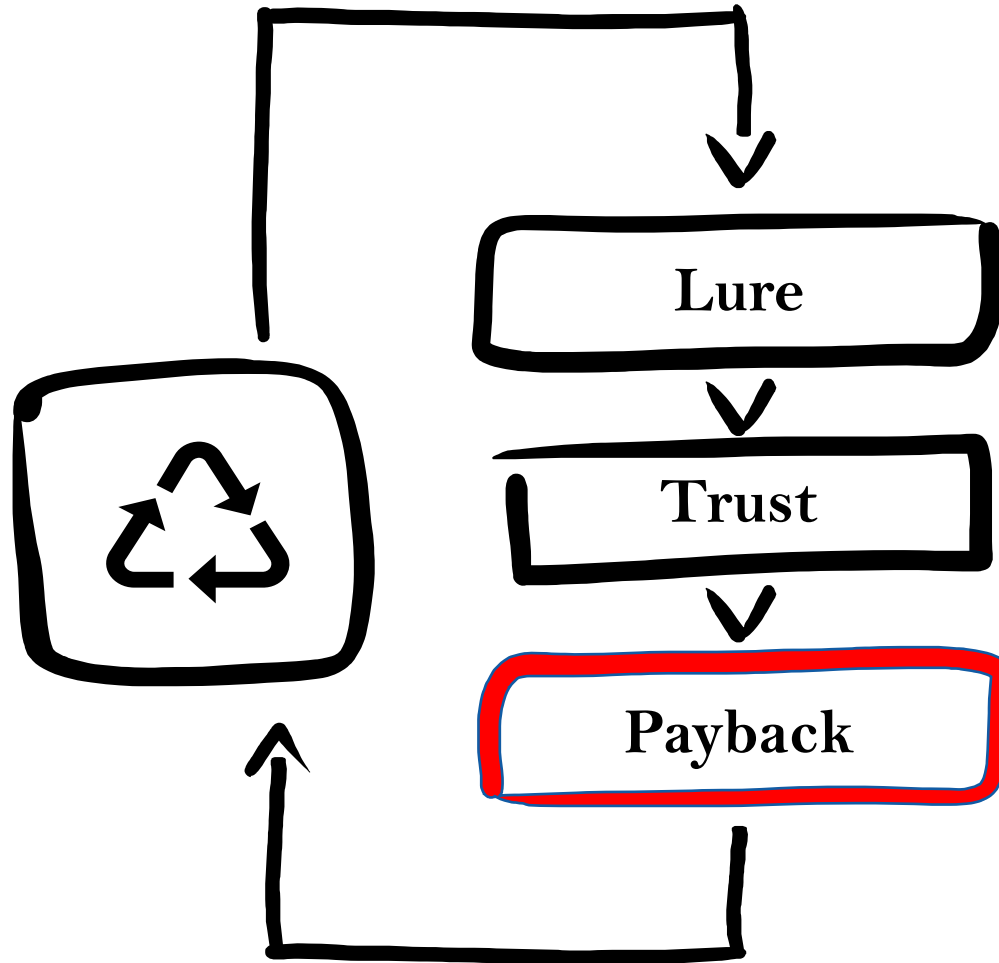
- Pays special attention to child, gives compliments, affection
- Offers romance, support, parties, drugs, "glamour" (hair, nails, etc.)
- Promises increased popularity in new peer group

Trust Stage



- Sell youth on the glamour of street life
- Introduces or provides alcohol and drugs
- Say “I love you” and have sex with the child
- Challenge boundaries set by parents or caregivers to further separate the child from his or her family

Payback/Exploitation Stage



- Forces child to payback by working in dance clubs, providing sexual services and/or through production of child pornography
- Sexual exploitation is the abuse of a position of vulnerability, differential power, or trust to profit monetarily or socially from the labor or commercial sex work of another person

Indicators of Human Trafficking

A variety of indicators can be “red flags” of trafficking.

Some of the ones below are not the only ones, nor will apply to every individual.



Physical

- Untreated injuries
- Bruising and burns
- Frequent STD's
- Physical and sexual abuse
- Substance use
- Dental issues
- Memory loss
- Exposure to toxic chemicals

Behavioral

- Confusing stories
- Inability to concentrate
- Unaware of location
- Guilt and shame about the experience
- Depression and Anxiety
- Protects the person that hurt them, minimize the abuse

Environmental

- Accompanied by someone that will answer for them
- In school settings, changes in behavior, wearing wrong clothes, not coming on time
- Living at overcrowded areas

Potential Warning Signs

Work and Living Conditions:

- Not free to leave
- In the commercial sex industry
- Unpaid or paid little through tips
- Excessively long work hours
- Not allowed breaks
- Owes a large debt

Mental Health or Behavior:

- Fearful, anxious, depressed
- Fearful of law enforcement
- Avoids eye contact



THE USE OF SUBSTANCES IN RECRUITMENT STRATEGIES

Substance use is one of the most influential techniques that human traffickers use to coerce, manipulate, and exploit their victims.

- **Recruitment Through Substance Use:** Traffickers may target individuals with existing substance abuse issues to recruit into a trafficking situation.
- **Control Through Substance Addiction:** Traffickers may also use substance addiction to keep victims in a trafficking situation. It can be framed as a reward or punishment, or to decrease the victim's ability to resist trafficking and abuse.
- **Substance Abuse as a Coping Mechanism:** Some victims of human trafficking may abuse substances as a response to the trauma of their trafficking victimization.



SIGNS OF DRUG USE AND ALCOHOL ADDICTION IN YOUNG PEOPLE

Receiving lower grades in school

Missing school or skipping classes

No longer extracurricular activities

No longer engaging in activities/hobbies

Getting into trouble at school (and/or at work)

Getting into trouble with authorities or the law

Spending time with a different friend

Spending more time alone

Spending more time out and away from their home

Having different eating habits

Having different sleeping habits

Weight loss

Loss of interest in their pets



SIGNS OF DRUG USE AND ALCOHOL ADDICTION IN YOUNG PEOPLE

Bloodshot eyes

Uncontrollable movement/fidget/tremors

Skin picking

Missing curfew

Mood swings

Loss of impulse control

Nosebleeds

Poor hygiene

Prescription drugs or alcohol go missing

Experiencing problems with family members or other loved ones

Experiencing problems with friends

Taking less time with their appearance

TAKE A PROACTIVE APPROACH



Do not be in denial... you must take action from the first sign of substance use.

When working with a youth and the presence of drug use is suspected you must staff your concerns with your supervisor immediately.

Establish a plan of action and clearly document the signs and your concerns.

Complete needed substance evaluations referrals. If the youth is involved with DJJ then notify their JPO of your concerns.

If you wait, then it may be too late so do not be afraid to take action...

Keeping Children Safe in Social Media



✓ Educate yourself and stay up to date with new apps.

✓ Discuss the apps/sites you find with your kids, ask them what they know, and keep the lines of communication open.

✓ Check the kids' devices frequently and thoroughly.

✓ Educate your children on the dangers of "oversharing" online.

✓ Set appropriate parental controls, age restrictions for downloading apps, time restrictions, etc.

✓ Most importantly, maintain a connected relationship with your kids!

Remember, a child's safety is more important than their privacy. As a parent/guardian, you aren't being nosy by checking their cell phone regularly; you are being cautious.



KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE ON GAMING SYSTEMS

- Establish ongoing open communication.
- Supervise use of all Internet-enabled devices.
- Know your child's online activities and friends.
- Regularly check the online communities your children use. Supervise the photos and videos your kids post and send online.
- Teach your children how to protect personal information posted online.
- Be sure your children use privacy settings on all social media and gaming platforms.
- Disallow access to chat rooms and only allow live audio chat with extreme caution.
- Limit your child's instant messaging (IM) contacts to a parent-approved buddy list.
- Use safe search engines.
- Set up the family's cyber-security protections.
- Utilize parental controls on your child's phone and other mobile devices.

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE ON GAMING SYSTEMS

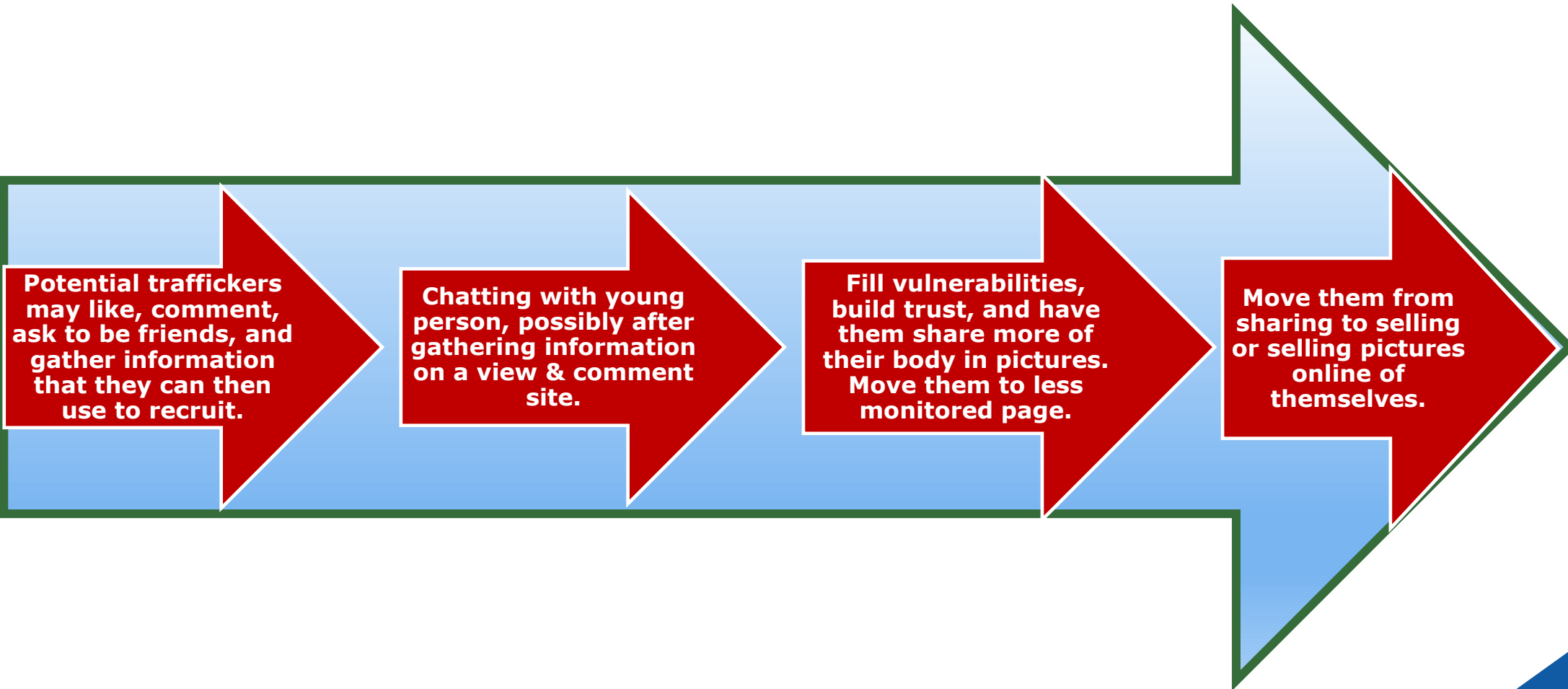
- Instruct your children to avoid meeting face-to-face with someone they only know online or through their mobile device.
- Teach your children how to respond to cyberbullies.
- Establish an agreement with your children about internet use at home and outside of the home.
- Parental controls should be utilized on all internet-enabled devices (desktops, laptops, gaming, mobile, music streaming and all other Wi-Fi connection devices.) However, these resources are not a substitute for parental supervision.
- Disallow access to chat rooms and only allow live audio chat with extreme caution.
- Limit your child's instant messaging (IM) contacts to a parent-approved buddy list.
- Use safe search engines.
- Set up the family's cyber-security protections.
- Utilize parental controls on your child's phone and other mobile devices.

PARENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT



PLENTY OF FISH



PLENTY OF FISH is a popular free dating app and website that encourages chatting with strangers. It allows users to browse profiles based on location.

MOCOSPACE



MOCOSPACE is a free social networking and dating app geared towards African American and Latino communities. Users can connect with strangers worldwide via text messages or voice calls.

MEETME



MEETME is a dating social media app that allows users to connect with people based on geographic proximity. As the app's name suggests, users are encouraged to meet each other in person.

WHATSAPP



WHATSAPP is a popular messaging app that allows users to send texts, photos, voicemails, make calls and video chats worldwide. WHATSAPP Uses an internet connection on smart phones and computers.

BUMBLE



BUMBLE is similar to the popular dating app "Tinder" however, it requires women to make the first contact. Kids have been known to use BUMBLE to create fake accounts and falsify their age.

LIVEME



LIVE.ME is a live-streaming video app that uses geolocation to share videos so users can find out a broadcaster's exact location. Users can earn "coins" as a way to "pay" minors for photos.

ASK.FM



ASK.FM is known for cyber bullying. The app encourages users to allow anonymous people to ask them questions.

HILY



HILY is a dating app where users can browse photos, engage in chats, send private videos and more. Based on the GPS location of a mobile device, strangers can arrange to meet up locally.

BEST SECRET FOLDER



BEST SECRET FOLDER is photos specifically meant to "hide and videos," according to app store descriptions. It features password protection, decoy videos and alarm settings.

GRINDR



GRINDR is a dating app geared towards gay, bi and transgender people. The app gives users options to chat, share photos and meet up based on a smart phone's GPS location.

TIKTOK



TIKTOK is a new mobile device app popular with kids used for creating and sharing short videos. With very limited privacy controls, users are vulnerable to cyber bullying and explicit content.

SNAPCHAT



SNAPCHAT is one of the most popular apps in recent years. While the app promises users can take a photo/video and it will disappear, new features including "stories" allows users to view content for up to 24 hours. Snapchat also allows users to see your location.

HOLLA



HOLLA is a self-proclaimed "addicting" video chat app that allows users to meet people all over the world in just seconds. Reviewers say they have been confronted with racial slurs, explicit content, and more.

CALCULATOR



CALCULATOR% is only one of SEVERAL secret apps used to hide photos, videos, files, and browser history.

ZOOSK



ZOOSK is a location-based dating app and website similar to many others. The app is available in 80 countries and utilizes a "carousel" feature which matches users with random strangers.

MONKEY



MONKEY is a live video chat app that connects users to random strangers worldwide, offering group chat and private message options. It claims to be rated for ages 12 and up but has "mild sexual content and nudity."

SKOUT



SKOUT is a location-based dating app and website. While users under 17 years old are unable to share private photos, kids can easily create an account using a different age.

BADDOO



BADDOO is a dating and social networking app where users can chat, share photos and videos and connect based on location. While the app is intended for adults only, teens are known to create profiles.

KIK



KIK allows anyone to contact and direct message your child. Kids can bypass traditional text messaging features. KIK gives users unlimited access to anyone, anywhere, anytime.

WHISPER



WHISPER is an anonymous social network that promotes sharing secrets with strangers. It also reveals a user's location so people can meet up.

HOT OR NOT




HOT OR NOT encourages users to rate your profile, check out people in their area, and chat with strangers. The goal of this app is to hook up.

 **OMEGLE** is an anonymous video app that critics believe is a perfect app for unsuspecting predators.

 **TINDER** is a location-based dating app and website.

 **CALCULATOR%** is one of several secret apps that allows used to hide photos, videos, files, and history.

 **GRINDR** is a location-based dating app and website.

 **MEETME** is a location-based dating app encouraging strangers to meet in person.

 **PERISCOPE** allows users to stream audio and video content and share it with other users.

 **SKOUT** is a location-based dating app and website.


 **BADOO** is a location-based dating and social media app with the ability to send photos, videos, and messages.


 **HOUSEPARTY** is a live chatroom for texts and video . Users have reported explicit content, racial slurs, and more.


 **WHATSAPP** is a messaging app that allows users to send photos, videos, and make calls and video chats.


 **ASK.FM** is known for cyberbullying.


 **BLENDR** is a location-based dating app and website.


 **KIK** is a direct messaging app that allows anyone to contact anyone else with unlimited access.


 **WHISPER** is an anonymous social network that promotes sharing secrets with strangers.


 **LIVEME** uses geolocation while livestreaming videos allowing users to see your exact location.


 **BUMBLE** is a dating app that requires a female to make the first contact. Fake accounts are known to be created.


 **XBOX LIVE** is an online service that behaves as a social network and allows for chatting with strangers.


 **HOLLA** is a video chat app. Users have reported explicit content, racial slurs, and more.

 **HOT OR NOT** is a dating app where users to rate the profile of others and to see and chat with people in their area.

 **TIKTOK** is a social app with limited privacy controls known for cyber bullying and explicit content.

 **WILDCRAFT** is a multi-player gaming app that allows group chatting and has been linked to cyberbullying.

 **INSTAGRAM** allows users to see your location and allows private messaging.


 **TWITTER** is increasingly popular with teenagers and has been linked to cyberbullying.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO PARENTS:

We recommend that you go through all the apps your child has on their phone.

After doing so, enable restrictions on “Installing Apps”. By doing this you allow a positive conversation when your child wants to download any app.

Questions such as, Why do you want this app? How will I know you are being safe when using this app? What will happen if I find you being inappropriate on this app?



Understanding the Dangers of Sextortion

What is Sextortion?

- Sextortion is a form of online exploitation where the perpetrator demands money, sexual favors, or more sexual images of the victim.
- To get their way, the sextorter will threaten to share or distribute explicit images, videos, or conversations of the victim with friends, family, school, social media or on internet sites/apps.

WHAT IS SEXTORTION?

SEXTORTION DESCRIBES A CRIME THAT HAPPENS ONLINE WHEN AN ADULT CONVINCES A PERSON WHO IS YOUNGER THAN 18 TO SHARE SEXUAL PICTURES OR PERFORM SEXUAL ACTS ON A WEBCAM.

Who are the sextorters or traffickers?



The sextorters could be both strangers met online, and/or once intimate romantic partners attempting to harass, embarrass, and control victims.



They could be any race, gender and socioeconomic class.



They may or may not live in the same, city, state or country as their victims.





Where are victims being targeted?

- Victims are often targeted on online websites and social media platforms they follow. Victims reported that the first contact with their perpetrator typically came in the form of a social media friend request.
- They approach children and adults on social media after using it to learn about their interests, friends, school, employer, family, etc.
- The perpetrators will send a friend/follow request, then will actively communicate on the site befriending the victim. Once a friendship is established, the perpetrator will move the conversation to a less monitored site, chat app or private video chat.



Tactics Used To Exploit Victims:

- Encouraged reciprocation (“I’ll show you, if you show me”).
- Seeking victims by offering something of value to the child or adult in exchange for sexually explicit photos/videos. This could be in the form of money, drugs or other tangible items.
- Recruitment from a fictitious modeling or talent agency to obtain sexual images of the child or adult.
- Developing a bonded relationship with the child or adult by establishing a friendship then progressing to a romantic relationship.
- Secretly recording sexually explicit pictures and/or videos of the child or adult during text, phone or video conversations.
- Physically threatening to harm, kill or sexually assault the child/adult or threatened to do the same to their family members and/or loved ones.
- Using multiple online identities to contact a child or adult.



Tactics Used To Exploit Victims:



- Pretending to be someone younger, older, and/or a member of the opposite or same sex (catfishing behaviors).
- Accessing the victims online social media or web-based accounts without authorization and stealing sexual images or videos of the child or adult.
- Threatening to create or creating sexual images or videos of the child or adult using digital-editing tools then threatening that they will post the images.
- Threatening to commit suicide if the child or adult does not provide sexual images or videos (reminder: the child or adult believes they are in a relationship with this person).
- Saving sexually explicit text or video chat conversations with the child or adult and threatening to post them online and/or on their social media accounts.

Sextortion on Gaming Devices

- There are several avenues for gamers to meet on online games. Often, they will use built-in chat features on gaming devices such as Xbox or PlayStation and use services like Steam. They could also connect on sites like Discord and Twitch. Gaming with strangers becomes normalized behavior and the youth often do not recognize the dangers because they believe they are “harmless gaming friends”.
- The gaming relationship could also develop into abusive relationships via online bullying behaviors. In other cases, adults posing as teenagers move conversations from gaming sites and chat rooms to platforms like Facebook Messenger, Kik, Zoom or other less monitored sites.
- After developing the gaming relationship sextorters often build on the relationship by sending gifts or gaming currency, such as V-Bucks in Fortnite.
- Finally, they begin desensitizing youth to sexual terms, sexual conversations and pornographic images then luring them to send nude pictures, videos of themselves or utilize live webcams to produce pornographic content.



How can it be harmful if the victim never meets their exploiter?

- Sextorters are criminals that can become very vicious and will not stop with their demands, harassment, and threats.
- Victims report feeling scared, alone, embarrassed, anxious, and desperate.
- Many feel like there's no way and are being cyberbullied on a frequent basis.
- Many suicides have reported that began with cyberbullying that led to sextortion. The victims did not feel there was a way out of the abusive situation and decided suicide was their only way out.
- It is very important to report sextortion to a safe person. Do not suffer in silence. There are people trained to help people that fall victims to sextortion.



Why are youth scared to report sextortion?

- The sextorter may approach the young person on any number of mobile or online sites, applications, or games. The lure may come as compliments, flattery or flirtation.
- The sextorter may also offer something in value in exchange for a taking a nude or scandalous picture. They could also lure them by offering online game credits or codes, money, cryptocurrency, and/or gift cards.
- The sextorter could skip the lure all together and go straight to threatening the victims by claiming they have an image of the young person that they will distribute if they do not comply. Many times, they will send the image to the victim to prove they have the picture to put more pressure on the person to obey. If the victim refuses to participate the sextorter may threaten to harm the victim or other people or things the victim cares about such as their families or family pet.



How can youth be safe online?

- Make their social media accounts private and do not friend/follow people that they do not know.
- Be selective on the information that is shared online.
- Understand that people are not always who they portray to be, and pictures and videos can be altered to manipulate you.
- Beware if you met a person on one app then they contact you on another app or site.
- Understand that any content created including texts, social media posts, online pictures or videos can be made public information. Information can also be retrieved even if previously deleted.
- Most importantly! Do not be afraid to ask for help!



HOW CRYPTOCURRENCY IS USED FOR HUMAN TRAFFICKING AND SEXUAL EXPLOITATION



An online marketplace: increasingly, sexually explicit content is being bought, sold, and shared on the internet and through online applications. This serves as a platform for recruiting buyers of sexual content and transactional sex.



Social media can be used to advertise sexual content and transactional sex. It can also be used to recruit individuals to post and/or sell sexually explicit content.



Cryptocurrency enables individuals to engage in illegal sexual activities while evading law enforcement. Built on blockchain technology, cryptocurrency has rapidly become a popular payment method for accessing Child Sexual Abuse Material. This is because it facilitates easy transactions while making it difficult to identify the individuals involved and trace the flow of money, presenting significant challenges for law enforcement.



HOW TO INTERACT WITH PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES



TARGETING DISABLED INDIVIDUALS

- Reliance on others for care
- Lack of awareness of exploitation
- Inability to self-identify
- Easily manipulated
- Lead isolated lives
- Crave friendship and human connection
- Unable to report unwanted touch
- May be receiving monetary support from state or federal sources



Abuse, Neglect, and Risk

Understanding the risks to recognize our role in prevention.



Child abuse and neglect are risk factors for Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC).



Children with disabilities are more likely to experience child abuse and neglect.



The risk of CSEC is heightened for children with disabilities.

Endangering Activities for People with Disabilities

- Running Away/Elopement
- Unsupervised use of Internet or cellphone
- Poor comprehension of dangerous situations
- Inability to recognize motive of others
- Inability to distinguish trafficker from boyfriend
- High-risk behaviors due to previous sexual abuse
- Exploitation tended to be prolonged

RISK FACTORS

- Reliance on others for care
- Lack of awareness of exploitation
- Inability to self-identify
- Manipulated easily
- Lead isolated lives
- Crave friendship and human connection
- Can be desensitized to touch
- May be unable to report unwanted touch
- May not believe that they have been abused or violated
- May be receiving monetary support from state and/or federal government

Investigation Tips When Interviewing a Person with Disabilities

- Use a forensic interviewer or subject matter experts that specialize in work with people with disabilities
- Accommodate for unique needs
- Ensure the presence of translator as needed



Financial Exploitation

In an attempt to make connections, a disabled adult may easily and unknowingly be exploited by others for their finances and benefits.
